June is a big month in the church's calendar. You may think that you have done Advent and Christmas, wrestled with Lent and celebrated Easter and now we are headed for summer and you can rest during the long season they call "ordinary time", that time when not much happens in church. "Ordinary time" has its own story that I will save for later, but before we get there, we have two important days.



First, we have Pentecost or Whitsun, the day the disciples received the Holy Spirit.

No one really knows why it was called Whitsun. That name was used from the 11th century when white clothing was associated with those who had been prepared for baptism, so it might have been the Sunday when they all came to church wearing their baptismal clothing. In early days, Whitsun was associated with several characteristics of the ancient pagan practice of Beltane, the celebration of the beginning of summer, when everyone wore bright or white summer clothes. I remember some people at church wearing white shoes, hats and gloves on Whitsun even when I was growing up. It might also have been referring to the day when the disciples finally "got" what Jesus had been trying to teach them, the day they got their "wits", or finally caught on. Maybe it was derived from the French Dimanche Huitieme (or eighth Sunday). We just don't know, but it is the Day of Pentecost, fifty days after Easter, which would be the eighth Sunday of Easter.

The history of Pentecost brings us back to our Jewish roots, to the Festival of Weeks, Shavuot, which celebrates the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai, the giving of the Law to Moses and the

people of God. For us, Pentecost celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit descending upon the believers in Jerusalem and the Church. It is the final culmination of the season of Easter.

The following week is Trinity Sunday, Most Principal Feasts in the calendar of the Episcopal



Church celebrate events in the life of Jesus, but this one is the only one that focuses on a doctrine of the Church. *"The Trinity is one God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The term is from the Latin tri, 'three,' and unites, 'unity.' The term was devised by Tertullian to express the mystery of the unity-in-diversity of God. Trinity means 'threefold unity.'"* (episcopalchurch.org)

So, we have some history, important events and deep concepts to celebrate, and in June we plan some baptisms too, when we will welcome new members to the parish, to God's family and to the world-wide Church, and look elsewhere in this newsletter for news about events for all the family this summer.

Plenty of reasons to celebrate and to be together in church!

June Outreach Focus of the Month: Wigs For Kids



Our Mission: Helping Children Look Themselves and Live Their Lives!

The various causes of hair loss in children don't result in just physical suffering. The change in their appearance can drastically undermine their self-image and sabotage their self-esteem. To help heal the pain of these struggles, Certified Cosmetic Therapist Jeffrey Paul founded Wigs For Kids, a non-profit hair donation organization that has been serving children suffering from hair loss since 1981.

Wigs For Kids is a cooperative effort among Certified Service Providers throughout North America who share a common goal. "Children shouldn't have to worry about how they look, especially when they're in the middle of a health crisis," says Jeffrey Paul. "We want to give these kids the opportunity to feel good about themselves again."

The cost of the hair replacement systems Wigs For Kids provides is approximately \$1,800. "These are custom-made hair replacements," says Jeffrey Paul. "Each prosthesis is hand-tied and is made completely from human hair. We make sure they look just like a child's own hair." "They won't come off on the baseball field or in the playground," he adds. "Kids can count on them. And because kids look just the way they did before, they feel better about themselves. They look in the mirror and their eyes light up. To see that light in their eyes – that's priceless."

Wigs For Kids Donation Information

Wigs For Kids depends on monetary and hair donations from generous individuals. The process for creating wigs made from real hair is costly and time-consuming. Wigs For Kids never charges the families that are receiving these custom hair replacement systems. Wigs for Kids is very grateful for the support of St. Peter's Episcopal Church.

Vestry First Quarter

When the Vestry met at our annual retreat in February this year, we identified 3 important objectives for our work this year: (1) engage and revitalize our current members; (2) expand St. Peter's visibility to the greater westside neighborhoods and (3) welcome our neighborhood onto our physical campus. We are well on our way to reaching these goals.

Engaging Our Membership

It is not possible to address this topic without using the "C" word (*covid*). Its toll on our parish life was as significant as the toll on our businesses and communities. One of our sage consultants advised us NOT to try to bring things back but to look forward. But admittedly, our rearview mirror was filled with richness and beauty and it has been difficult if not impossible to long for that world. So, we are doing both: revitalization and reinvention. Much of this has been the result of, or more accurately, complicated by staff departures. But we are moving forward - not backward and we have momentum:

- Choir. David Wagner, along with a some of our choral scholars and our gifted choir members, emerged from COVID with new determination. On a weekly basis, David wasn't sure who would be available to sing. Nevertheless, he organized the music with grace and an infinite amount of joy, that translated into an admirable music program which brought our beloved hymns to life and engendered within us the comfort and connection we all longed for during shutdown.

Our search continues to fill this role and Vestry remains committed to ensuring that St. Peter's maintains its high standard of music excellence.

- Children's Worship. When St. Peter's opened its doors after the shutdown, something vibrant was missing. Children. While it was wonderful to see everyone back in church, there were literally NO CHILDREN and few parents.

In response, a small group of parents joined forces, and with the assistance of Sally and involvement of a Diocesan consultant, a plan evolved. We brought children into the church with their parents. And we found a way to make church welcoming for our teens.

- There is no dispute that the children's area and inclusion of kids in our weekly worship is a huge success. Sally continues to provide inspirational "Children's Words" to our youngest members and their presence in our weekly worship has been welcome. Thank you to Kristen Gardner and Christine Clark for not only envisioning the plan but working tirelessly to make it happen. Our middle and high school students have likewise begun to come together under the guidance of Jeff Gardner, Tucker Handley and Cody Crosby. We still need adult volunteers for this program for 1-2 Sundays per month. If you have 30 minutes and can talk to a teen, please consider pitching in!
- As we enter our second quarter, Vestry will finalize a job description for our next Director and our search will commence. **BUT WE NEED YOU!** The most effective way to attract a new Director is to evidence the need: **KIDS IN CHURCH!** Please help us "advertise" our need by joining us on Sundays!
- Search Committee. The Search Committee has completed its parish survey and is ready to begin phase 2. Thank you to the entire Search Committee and to each of you who participated in the discernment process. We are **THAT MUCH CLOSER** to our next rector!

Expanding Our Visibility

Taking St. Peter's "on the road" if you will, is a long-term project - one that is not designed to have a "completion deadline." In the words of some great philosopher, "it is the journey, not the destination." For St. Peter's to remain relevant, we must embrace the community in which we reside, and the communities from which our membership will ultimately be drawn. While our building(s) are

beautiful, beauty alone will not attract new members. St. Peter's is actually a gem inside the walls - our liturgy, our music and most importantly, our willingness to embody Christ's words, are the elements that will ensure our longevity. The most important way for us to insure for our future is through our presence in our neighborhoods.

As a first step in responding to this objective we have "registered" as a participant in the Lakewood Arts Festival, on Saturday, August 6, where we will have a "booth." This may well be the first time St. Peter's has attended the event and it will require a parish-wide participation for success. In the next month or two, we will be asking you to invest your time to decide on how we present St. Peter's at the event and we will also need volunteers to "man the booth" at the festival for 1-2 hours that Saturday. More information to come on this.

We are also inviting you to lead us in our "outward bound" initiative. In what ways can we make St. Peter's more visible to our neighbors and become active participants in our community?

Sharing our Physical Space

Sharing our physical space means inviting those same neighbors to join us at our "house," to use our beautiful buildings and grounds for life-supporting activities. This form of outreach not only provides a resource for the needs of our existing members but will also be a valuable tool in attracting new members. Here, we have made great progress!

- The Community Meal is alive and well, and while still not in-person, we are serving about 50 meals per month in "drive-in" style. We still need cooks, and we still need volunteers, and we can always use your donations!
- On May 17, 2022 St. Peter's opened its doors for the first time in many years to Alcoholics Anonymous ("AA"). AA has a rich and important connection to the Episcopal Church. For those of you who do not know the story, AA was founded in 1935 in Akron, Ohio. A struggling, traveling salesman (Bill W) was staying at the Mayflower Hotel in Akron.

- He was passing through the lobby, heard the familiar bar noises coming from the Mayflower's restaurant and that triggered within him a desire to drink. But embracing a desire to remain sober, Bill W. turned his attention to the hotel's list of area churches. There he found the number for St. Paul's Episcopal Church and called the rector, Dr. Walter Tunks. He explained his powerlessness over alcohol to Dr. Tunks who at the time was a member of the Oxford movement, along with Henrietta Seiberling. Dr. Tunks invited Bill W to join him and Miss Seiberling, along with a 4th person, Dr. Bob, at Stan Hewitt Hall to address the insidious disease of alcoholism and find a path towards sobriety. Together, they formed what is now known as Alcoholics Anonymous.

Against this backdrop, it is both an honor and privilege to welcome the Tuesday Night Ladies Old School group to St. Peters.

- On June 11, St. Peter's will also welcome the North Shore Men's Chorus, along with one of its members, John Keller, who will use St. Peter's for choral practice. More than 50 voices will fill our building - a sound worth celebrating!

These achievements are possible because of your vision, your participation, and mostly, our collective faith and discernment. **WHAT DID WE NEGLECT TO DISCUSS OR APPLAUD?** Are you doing things that we haven't highlighted? **TELL US!!** Are there things you would like to see happen? Are there ways in which we can realize these objectives? Please let your vestry know!




Spring Clean-Up


Name Tags
