Dear St. Peter's Family,

Our Stewardship theme this year—“**Heart, Hands, Hope: Generosity that Gives**”—is an invitation to go deeper into the life God calls us to live. Over the past few weeks, you've heard testimonials from your fellow parishioners, each one a unique testament to the joys and insights of a life lived in Christian stewardship. Their experiences, while deeply personal, share a common thread: Generosity is the pathway to spiritual freedom. Their faith inspires ours, and as we move forward together, I want to offer a few practical thoughts on how to begin or deepen this essential spiritual journey.

The first steps are always the hardest—and the most important! I think back to my own kids taking their first steps: they were shaky and tentative, but filled with optimism and excitement. Slowly, those steps became confident and stable, ultimately developing into a life of greater freedom and possibility.

Our spiritual journey is similar. Learning the practice of generosity can feel unnatural or overwhelming, especially if we've been conditioned by a mindset of scarcity around our money. When we focus on constant accumulation—“get and keep as much as you can”—money can easily become a kind of idol, holding undue power and persuasion over our decisions.

For many, the idea of a tithe (sharing 10% of your income) is a worthy goal, but it can feel paralyzing. If that's you, I want to encourage you to start small. I call it “micro-generosity.”

Make a deliberate choice to give a small amount on a regular basis. Plan for it, and do it. This intentional act, no matter how small, begins to loosen the grip of scarcity on your heart. You will find that taking part in this simple, consistent practice is deeply freeing.

Christ taught that fostering a heart of generosity is the very way we open our lives to spiritual freedom. Generosity shifts our focus from what we lack to a place of authentic gratitude for all that we possess. That's why we ask you to fill out a pledge card. It's not a contract; it is simply a way to record your intentionality—to mark that first deliberate step of micro-generosity.

By beginning to give, you take part in the collective mission of our church. Your giving supports everything:

The essential teaching and inspiring worship that feeds your soul.

Our extensive outreach and community projects.

The beautiful music and the inviting facility where we gather.

You are joining your small, intentional step with the thousands of generous acts that make our shared ministry possible. You will see that you are part of something good.

Let's take those first hopeful steps together this year, and discover the true freedom that comes from a **Generosity that Gives**.

Blood Cancer United

St. Peter's "Bioswale Pollinator Garden"

Did you know that the retention basin at the corner of Detroit Ave. and W. Clifton—behind the new St. Peter's sign—was designed to manage stormwater runoff during heavy rains? During the 2019 construction of new offices and childcare facilities, the designers opted to implement a **bioswale** instead of surrounding the new stormwater drain with concrete. "Bioswales" serve as landscaped ditches that slow stormwater runoff and reduce erosion.

Bioswales also support biological processes by incorporating native, non-invasive plant species commonly found in Northern Ohio. Such plants provide essential food and habitat for local insects, birds, and butterflies—helping sustain the region's delicate ecosystem. Without them, this natural balance is at risk.

Recently, a dedicated team consisting of Marie Fechik-Kirk, Julie Steigerwald, Dave Tabar, John Rich, Nat Pendleton, Linda Lange and Naomi Opdycke—took on the task of revitalizing the space. The first phase involved removing invasive species such as mugwort and tree of heaven, followed by the delivery of new perennials. Under Marie's guidance, the team planted a variety of native species, including *Sedum* 'Autumn Joy', black-eyed Susans (*Rudbeckia*), Joe Pye weed (*Eupatorium*), purple coneflower (*Echinacea*), butterfly milkweed (*Asclepias tuberosa*), and swamp milkweed (*Asclepias incarnata*).

Our hope is that the space will serve as a model of environmental stewardship by supporting native plants, pollinators, and local biodiversity.

Dave applied for a small Conservation Action Grant from the Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District to help fund the plantings and transform the area into a vibrant pollinator garden. *And*—out of 45 projects submitted—St. Peter’s Bioswale Pollinator Garden was one of 13 projects to receive the award! While a work in progress, planting now sets the stage for a beautiful and beneficial spring bloom. Stop by and enjoy its early stages!



Help Decorate the **Chrismon Tree** this Advent

Beginning November 29th, you will find a selection of Chrismons on the table next to the tree, each related to the day’s theme and readings. Additionally, you are invited to a special crafting project: making the **Mary and Joseph Chrismon** for the Fourth Sunday of Advent (Remember, Jesus isn't born until Christmas!). All ages are welcome to join us for this project in between services and during coffee hour.

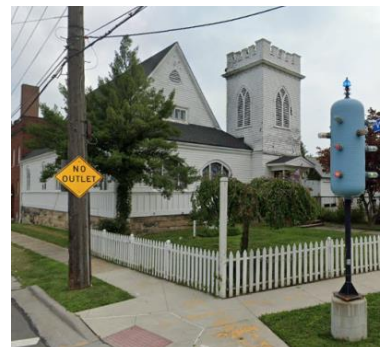

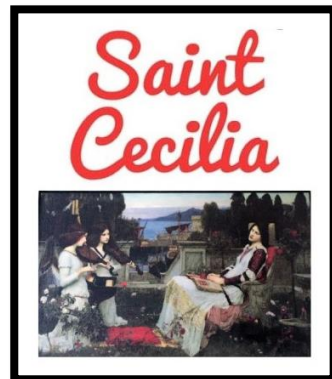

CHILI COOK-OFF



The Chili Cook-Off and Fall Festival were so FUN! Thank you to all the entrants and eaters, LOL! Congratulation to Sarah T. for winning First Place with her Salish & Kootenai Tribal recipe. Below is the recipe, adapted from the Three Sisters Stew recipe provided by the Confederated Salish & Kootenai Tribal College extension course.

1/2 cup Rolled Oats

0-3 Chipotle Peppers in Adobo*

Use 3 peppers for SPICY (*drop to 2 or 1 pepper or even no peppers based on your taste. But put as much adobo sauce in as you can either way. The sauce has flavor & a touch of spice, but the peppers hold the heat.*)

1 15 1/2 can Whole Tomatoes & their liquid

1/2 White Onion - rough chop to about 2 inch chunks

3 cloves Garlic - crushed just enough to peel easily

1 Tbsp light Oil (safflower, canola, vegetable)

4 cups (32 oz.) Vegetable Stock

1 16oz bag frozen Choclo - *hominy would work here too*

1 small Butternut Squash - peeled and diced into 1-1 1/2 inch cubes

1/2 Acorn Squash - peeled and diced into 1-1 1/2 inch cubes

1/2 White Acorn Squash - peeled and diced into 1-1 1/2 inch cubes (*One whole Acorn Squash of either color would work here too*)

2 cans Pinto Beans & their liquid

2 cans Great Northern Beans - drained but not rinsed Salt to taste

Place rolled oats in food processor or blender. Grind to a near-powder. Add 0-3 chipotle peppers and most of the sauce. Add tomatoes, onion and garlic. Pulse into small chunks. Scrape down the sides. Blend until smooth. Heat a dutch oven or heavy-bottom pot over medium-high heat. Add 1 Tbsp neutral oil. Pour sauce into hot pan (careful, it will spatter!) and stir. Bring to a low boil. Reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until when a spoon is dragged through it leaves a trail of visible pan behind. About 10 minutes. Add vegetable stock and choclo and salt to taste (this will depend on how salty your stock is) . Simmer 10 minutes. Add squash. Simmer 15 minutes. Add beans. Simmer 5 minutes. Test squash...you want it just barely undercooked at this point...soft but still with a bit of bite. Turn off heat. Salt to final taste. Cover dutch oven. Wait 10 minutes before serving. This will allow the squash to finish without getting squishy, allow the oatmeal to finish its thickening job and allow the flavors to fully meld.

The Three Sisters grow in harmony together. The squash, corn and bean plants were important food staples to American indigenous peoples, including the the tribes that make up the confederation the youth visited for their mission trip last summer. I adapted this recipe from one of theirs. As we look forward to welcoming some Montana youth next year, I chose this chili to honor this tradition. I am so proud (and stunned!) to have won first prize amongst pot after pot of winners! It just goes to show, something that is vegan and gluten-free can still satisfy and pack a whollop of spice!

(a pilot program)

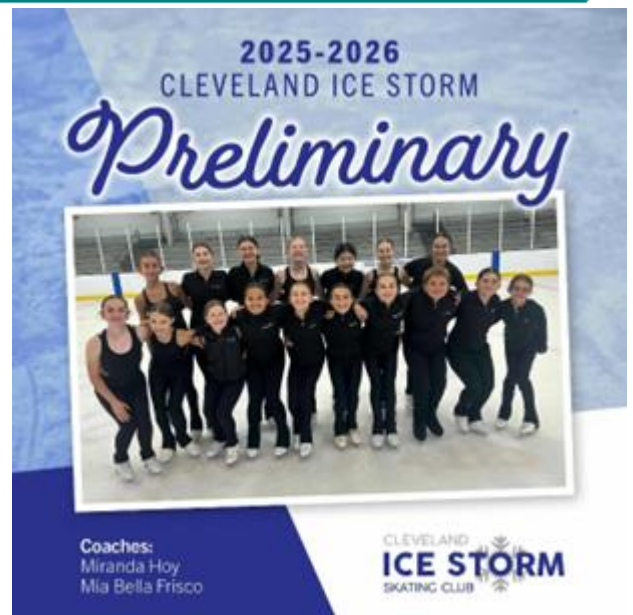

Homeless Awareness Sleep-Out is Saturday, November 15th into Sunday, November 16th. We will be participating in the Homeless Awareness Sleep-Out on Saturday, November 15, 2025. This will be our 18th year sleeping outside on a cold night to raise awareness and funds for local homeless shelters. Our youth will be “Pan-Handling” on each of the four

corners adjacent to our church. Even with cardboard boxes and tents clustered together, sleeping bags and layered clothing we are in for a cold night.

Our evening will unfold as follows:

5:30 pm arrive at church and begin organizing our shelters outside

6:30 pm begin collecting donation along Detroit and West Clifton Avenues

11:00 pm head into the church for a snack, recap the evening, conversation

Midnight head to bed in our boxes and tents

7:00 am head into the church for breakfast

7:45 am begin collecting donations again along the avenues of Detroit and West Clifton

10:00 am begin clean-up and head inside for communion

Adult chaperones keep watch in shifts all night long. As you know Lakewood has a large number of churches and bars so a lot of foot traffic pass by after last call.

Some of this traffic stop by and warm up by our fire, treat us to some conversation, and make donations.

Our youth take these monetary donations to these shelters personally, receive a tour and get some time for fellowship with residents. It is always important to us that our young folks see these fundraisers full circle.


Our youth in the past have chosen the following shelters to support; Laura’s Home, LMM, Y-Haven, Veterans Domicile, Trials for Hope, and Norma Herr. We aim to raise about \$3,000 so that a donation of \$500.00 can be made to each of these shelters.
