Dear St. Peter's Family,

In a conversation recently, my daughter introduced me to a phrase I had not heard before: “the third place.” It comes from Ray Oldenburg (2023 re-release of his book ‘The Great Good Place’), who described three important places in our lives. The first is home. The second is work or school. And the third is a place where we regularly go simply to be with other people—to talk, laugh, share life, and become part of a community that gives them a sense of belonging to something “more”.

What struck me about my daughter's description was how relevant the idea was in her life. So much of our lives happens through screens. We can work remotely, shop online, or stream entertain at home. We live digitally committed more than ever, and yet have fewer places where we simply show up and spend time with other people.

It made me wonder about our church. Could St. Peter's be a kind of third place?

Of course, the church is much more than that. We come here to worship God, hear Scripture, receive the Eucharist, pray, and live together as the Body of Christ. But parish life has always been about more than what happens during worship. It is also about relationships—sharing meals, discovering common interests, serving together, and having those unexpected conversations that turn acquaintances into friends.

As we begin our new program year, I want to encourage all of us to find a place where you can connect at St. Peter's.

On Sunday, September 13, after the 10:00 a.m. service, we'll have an Ice Cream Social. Representatives from our ministries and fellowship groups will be mingling and ready to talk about what they do. Come, have some ice cream, meet someone new, and be curious about what is happening in the life of our parish. You're new third place might be a Foyers Group; Bowling Group; Games Night; Choir; a Bible Study Group or Community Meal.

Maybe you'll discover a ministry that interests you. Maybe you'll find a group where you fit. Maybe you'll simply meet someone you haven't talked with before. My hope is that St. Peter's will continue to be not simply a place where we attend worship, but a place where we belong to find something more...a third place.

Realm Giving Is Here!

As part of our transition to Realm, we are excited to introduce Realm Giving – a secure, simple and flexible way to support St. Peter's and its ministries.

Realm giving allows you to give anytime, anywhere using your computer, tablet or smartphone. You can set up a one time or recurring gift and select where your gift goes (Pledge, Outreach, Community Meal, etc.). You may even give to more than one fund in the same transaction.

You can access Realm Giving several ways. Log into your account on your computer, use the Realm App, use the QR code or Text to Give.

These are the 4 ways to arrive at the Giving Page:

1 – Website – Log into your Realm account at Onrealm.org. On the Connect page click on Giving. Then click on the +Give blue box in the upper left.

2 – Realm App – In the Realm app click on the Giving Icon at the bottom of the screen. Then click on "Make a Gift".

3 – QR Code – open the camera app on your smartphone and point it at the QR code. Click on the yellow On Realm box.



4 – Text – Text the word Keys to 7356

Once you use any of these methods to arrive at the Giving Page, you do the following:

Enter the amount of your gift and then click on the small down arrow to select where the money goes. The default is Regular Pledge Payment, but you can change it by clicking the down arrow to the right to see other options.

If you would like to donate to more than one area, click on +Add Fund and it will allow you to add another amount and select another area.

After the amount(s) and Fund(s) are entered, click on “Continue”. This will take you to the payment page.

You may pay with a credit or debit card or ACH. ACH bank transfers generally have lower processing costs, allowing more of your gift to support the church. When paying you have the option to add an amount to help the church offset the credit card processing fees. This step is optional.

Realm Giving is a new payment option that will be available in addition to traditional cash and check methods. You can use whichever method you are most comfortable with.

If you have questions about setting up your Realm account or using Realm Giving, the church office is happy to assist you. We can help you create your Realm account, log in, scan the QR code, or set up your first online gift.

Monthly Outreach September



Founded in 1978, (as Hospice of the Western Resrve), **Reserve Care** is one of the largest nonprofit hospice providers in Ohio. Services include end-of-life, palliative, and respite care, along with caregiver and grief support.

Most patients receive care in their own homes, but Reserve Care also provides care in assisted living facilities, hospitals, nursing homes, and retirement communities. For those whose end-of-life care symptoms are difficult to manage at home, there are also four acute-care facilities, including David Simpson Hospice House (Cleveland's east side), Ames Family Hospice House (Westlake), Hospice of Medina County (Medina), Stein Hospice (Sandusky), and the newest location Reserve Care Hospice Center at 18485 Lakeshore Blvd., in Cleveland. Overall, Reserve Care delivers compassionate and dignified care to individuals facing life-limiting diagnoses in 18 Ohio counties.
